## CLUB HISTORY

Our Clubhouse was built in the 1920's. It was bought from the owner in August of 1955 when our Club was formed.

This fine old home lent itself to instant conversion as a Club. The waterfront could easily be improved. The Royal Palms bordered the driveway, the tennis courts, swimming pool, aviary and the beautiful gardens and shrubbery seemed ideally suited to the prestigious character of the newly formed yacht club.

It soon became apparent that additional grounds for dry storage of small boats would be needed.

A fifty foot strip of property, reaching from Bayshore Drive to the Bay, was acquired. It already had a dredged and bulkheaded slip, and this made immediate dock facilities available. This old residence was remodeled with a greatly enlarged dining room and kitchen facility. The garage was rebuilt as a bar and lounge on the lower level, and the upstairs was converted to card and committee rooms, with a suite reserved at one end for the living quarters for the manager and his wife. As the grounds were improved, the tennis courts and the aviary were eliminated in favor of parking spaces and driveways.

All the atmosphere of a small, eminent club was evident when the doors opened for the first formal reception and house warming on May 11, 1956.

*Upon entering the Clubhouse through the front doorway, one can see original decorations, called Armorials, looking over the front door. Reading left to right,*

Combined crosses of England, Ireland, and Scotland constituted original British flags. There were more than 30 variations initially. The armorial flag above Coral Reef's front door was almost identical to the final choice used by ancestors of the Coral Reef gentlemen.

The Eagle emblem was used as a symbol of power and authority by Roman legions in 500 BC and introduced throughout the Roman Empire, reaching England in 55 BC. It became a universal symbol of personal achievement and orderly government. It is still in vogue, virtually worldwide, by military and civilian authorities of high rank.

Winchester Cathedral's site, used by Roman Legions, dates from 55 BC. Circles represent earlier Roman official residences, courts, cloisters, et al. Actual cathedral was started in 1329. Winchester was capitol of England in the 9th century. Ancestor of Coral Reef resident probably held office in religious institution or high civilian status when Winchester was political center. The circles on this armorial represent the residence in the City of Winchester of many religious, civil and military headquarters.

The fleur di lis embellished as shown in accordance with historical records identifies the person wearing, bearing or displaying this royal emblem as having a rank in the French nobility. Accordingly, it quietly announces that the bearer had status in the French royal family about 1520.

The crossed chain in gold (continuous links) is an armorial for the holder of a hereditary title (in English peerage) as an earl. This grants him lifetime access and control over a land grant. The title (Earl) and the benefits pass on upon his death to his oldest living son. The rank, i.e. "Earl" passes in the same manner in full force in color and design of armorial.

The armorial over the fireplace: The custom still exists to display lineage armorial status. Above a fireplace, centered on the mantle, at Coral Reef the fifth in line hereditary armorial is displayed and identified by the purple ring with a red center which is a visual announcement that the household's chief is in an Earl.

## SAILING HISTORY

The history of sailboat racing on Biscayne Bay can be traced back to February 22, 1887, when Miami pioneer William Brickell defeated fifteen other skippers in the area's first Washington's Birthday regatta.

More than 100 years have passed, and South Florida has become one of the premiere venues for the sport of sailing, both racing and cruising. From the professional sailors heating it up off Miami Beach in international offshore competition, to the one-design hopefuls trying to qualify for a berth in the next Olympics, to the family cruisers enjoying the island-hopping of our Keys and parks, there is something for everyone.

We've enjoyed our annual [Columbus Day Regatta](#) and festivities for over 50 years, and recall years when over 700 boats sailed in the competition, with again that many support boats waiting for them at the overnight rendezvous off Elliott Key.

Other annual destination events include the [Miami to Key Largo Race](#), [Miami to Palm Beach Race](#), the [Lime Cup](#) round trip to Ft. Lauderdale, and for many years the [Miami to Nassau Race](#) as part of the SORC.

Olympic hopefuls train here year round, and the [Miami Olympic Classes Regatta](#) in late January draws teams from around the world to scout out the competition for the next Olympic Regatta.

The [Bacardi Cup Star Regatta](#) began as a tradition in Cuba in 1927, and continues out of Coral Reef Yacht Club each year as the sailors of this classic yacht meet for competition and camaraderie. You will appreciate the sculpture on the front lawn which was gifted to CRYC by the Bacardi Company.

Since 1957 the [Lightning Midwinter Championship](#) has been sailed each spring as part of the Lightning Class Southern Circuit. And the past decade has seen the development of the fabulous [Orange Bowl International Youth Regatta](#) over the Christmas holidays. This annual event draws sailors from all 50 states and numerous other countries to CRYC for a week of intense racing and fun. Double that number if you count family members, coaches and friends. We are honored to host the sailors, family members, coaches and friends who attend these annual events.

## GUEST INFORMATION

### BOAT ARRIVAL

The Coral Reef Yacht Club is located in the Coconut Grove section of Miami on the western shore of Biscayne Bay, north of the City of Miami's Dinner Key Marina. There are two major approaches to the Club, one through Dinner Key Channel, which allows for an 8' draft, and the second, a privately maintained channel of 5' depth just north of Dinner Key Channel.

### CAR ARRIVAL

From the north or south, exit US 1 (South Dixie Highway) east onto SW 27<sup>th</sup> Ave. Stay on 27<sup>th</sup> Ave. to its end at South Bayshore Drive, turn left, and proceed two and a half blocks to the CRYC at 2484 South Bayshore Drive. From the airport, use LeJeune Road South to 836 east, take the south exit at SW 27<sup>th</sup> Ave. and proceed to Bayshore Drive. Alternate routes from the airport are also available.

### IDENTIFICATION

Visitors by car must identify themselves to the guard upon arrival. By car, you may present your respective Club membership card to the guard at the gate. Visitors arriving by boat must contact our Dock Master in advance by telephone 305.858.1733 or on VHF channel 71.

### RECIPROCITY

Reciprocity is available to all Florida Council of Yacht Club members. Reciprocity is conditioned upon advance reservations being made with the Club Manager or the Dockmaster. Reciprocity with Clubs not in the Florida Council of Yacht Clubs will be honored upon receipt of a letter from the home club officers or manager requesting guest privileges.

### CLUB HOURS

Open from 9 a.m. to midnight, Tuesday through Sunday. Club is closed Mondays, Christmas and New Year's Day.

### DRESS CODE

Casual attire is acceptable. Jackets preferred in the Dining Room. No one is permitted in the Clubhouse without shirt and shoes, or in bathing attire.

### DINING FACILITIES

Reservations requested through the Dining Room. Luncheon is served in the Clubhouse from noon to 2 p.m. Tuesday through Friday, and dinner is served from 6:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. Tuesday through Sunday.

### YARDARM BAR & LOUNGE

Open noon to midnight, Tuesday through Sunday.

### SNACK BAR AND REEF BAR

Open Saturday and Sunday only. Breakfast is available from 8 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. and lunch from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Pool bar is open from Thursdays (our Happy Hour Night) 5 p.m.—8 p.m., Fridays 6 p.m.—10 p.m., Saturdays 11:30 a.m.—dinner hour of 10 p.m. Sundays 11:30 a.m.—dusk, 7 p.m. Please note that no pets are permitted on the property except on a leash to and from your boat.

### GRATUITIES

Tipping is prohibited, service charge automatically added to bill.

### PAYMENT

If your Club has reciprocity, all bills will be sent to your Club. Guest accounts can be arranged at time of check-in. No cash transactions permitted.

### SWIMMING POOL

Open during daylight hours, no lifeguard or attendant is on duty, swimming is at your own risk. Children who are under 12 years of age must be accompanied by an adult over 21. Appropriate bathing attire is required.

### MARINA DOCKAGE

Available only by advance reservation with the Dockmaster. Arrival must be between 8am and 5pm. Upon arrival, the visitors must sign in with the Dockmaster. Ice is available from the dockmaster. No fuel is available. Our docks can accommodate a yacht up to 45' in length with 6' draft. Space is limited and it is suggested you contact Coral Reef Yacht Club at least one day in advance. Only marine electrical connections are permitted. Men's and Women's showers are adjacent to the pool deck. Please see our Marina Rules.

### DOCKAGE FEES

Visitors are limited to a 3-day stay, unless prior arrangements have been made with the Dockmaster.

### RADIO CONTACT

We monitor Channel 71 during Club hours.

Built in 1891 by Commodore Ralph Munroe, The Barnacle is the oldest home in Miami still on its original site. Munroe, a yacht designer and photographer, founded Biscayne Bay Yacht Club in 1887 and was Commodore for twenty years. The Barnacle is now a museum and is operated as a State Historic Site.

# MARINA RULES

1. All boat owners must register with the Dockmaster upon arrival.
2. Garbage and trash must be deposited in the containers ashore. Dumping any sewage or refuse overboard is prohibited.
3. Noise shall be kept to a minimum at all times. Please use discretion when operating engines, generators, radios and television sets.
4. The owners of boats using the docks are responsible for seeing their boats are secured, and that they present no danger of damage to themselves, the docks or to other boats.
5. Hoses and dock lines will be kept neatly coiled when not in use.
6. Laundry shall not be hung anywhere at any time.
7. Boat owners are responsible for any loss or damage they cause to any property kept or stored on the Club property or docks.
8. No "For Sale" signs are permitted on any boats at the Club.
9. Fishing from the docks or feeding of any birds is prohibited.
10. Pets must be kept on a leash when off your boat, and litter clean up is the responsibility of the pet owner. Pets are not allowed in areas where food is consumed.
11. Charcoal or any type of fire is strictly forbidden.
12. Walkways on docks shall not be obstructed at any time.
13. Our Dock Master will provide you with a copy of our CRYC Hurricane Policy if your stay with us is during hurricane season. These rules must be adhered to, no exceptions.
